

Qualitative research suggests more complex relationships

Wait time is not necessarily
Sisyphean time




Objective

 To explore lived experiences of patients awaiting consultation and scheduled surgery

Methods

- Comparative design 3 patient groups
- Data collection Fall '09 to Fall '10
 - Serial qualitative interviews



Findings

Restriction...




Not working, not doing things that I used to be able to do. Feeling that at 60 years old I'm "retired due to health". Doing less housework, being able to do less housework, so feeling that I am not doing an adequate job of the only job I have left. Um...anger, just anger at the pain.

Mary, hip surgery, age 60

Uncertainty...

I would like to get it over with so I, then they could find out what I could do. Can I go back to [the same work]? Maybe I won't have the strength.

Peter, shoulder surgery, age 52



Resignation...

I don't think [waiting] has affected me at all. I could understand that the doctors are busy and that so, you know, you just got to learn and do the best you can, so that is what I done. Hillary, cardiac surgery, age 77



Coping...

But don't dwell on waiting, you know, keep yourself busy, keep your mind going, otherwise you are going to end up a vegetable and cause you forced it all upon yourself.

Rolland, cardiac surgery, age 78



Opportunity...

Normally you have a full day to be able to do stuff if you feel well enough to do them — why not visit with people and go do some reading or do things that you can't do when you are in the work world.

Lee, cardiac surgery, age 43






















Policy Implications

- Increase transparency of wait time experience for patients
- Devote resources to allaying restrictions
- Evaluate efficacy of reducing absolute wait times
